### The Pope's Act of Consecration of Russia and **Ukraine to the Immaculate Heart of Mary**



O Mary, Mother of God and our Mother, in this time of trial we turn to you. As our Mother, you love us and know us: no concern of our hearts is hidden from you. Mother of mercy, how often we have experienced your watchful

We have ravaged the garden of the earth with war and by our sins we have broken the heart of our heavenly Father, who desires us to be brothers and sisters. We grew indifferent to everyone and everything except ourselves. Now with shame we cry out: Forgive us, Lord!

# "Coffee And..." in Place of Soup & Salad This Lent 2022





During our 2022 Lenten Season we are offering a new social gathering on Friday evenings immediately prior to 7:00 p.m. Stations of the Cross.

Last year and in 2020 we cancelled the Lenten Soup & Salad Suppers because of the covid pandemic. This year as Lent has arrived, the pandemic seems to be waning but it is still not entirely behind us, and the preparation and serving of food and beverages at a community gathering is still of concern for some.

So we are "modifying the menu" but not the fundamental concept of Soup & Salad this year. Instead of the home-made soups and home-made salads and other simple, minimal supper items that have been prepared and then served family-style and buffet-style in past years, this year we will offer coffee, tea, bottled water, individual containers of fruit juices, and individually wrapped portions of cakes and cookies – "light fare" – to be enjoyed along with conversation and fellowship beginning at 6:15 p.m. each Friday with the Praying of Grace and before moving to the Upper Church shortly before 7:00 p.m. for Stations of the Cross. These evening refreshments are intended to make us mindful of foregoing a more substantial meal on the Fridays of Lent in favor of smaller portions that provide sustenance while also highlighting the Lenten themes of fasting, sacrifice, self-denial, and penitential practices.

"Coffee And..." will take place in the Lower Church. Thanks once again to the Parish Hospitality Committee members for their vision and efforts in putting this spiritual and social event together for us. May our Lenten journeys nourish our minds, hearts, and souls; strengthen and refresh us; and bring us closer to the Sacred Heart of Jesus.



# Next Sunday (April 10) is Palm Sunday

Palms will be blessed at the beginning of all Masses next weekend and distributed at the conclusion of each Palm Sunday Mass.

## MORNING PRAYER ON APRIL 14, 15, AND 16

Mass is not celebrated on Holy Thursday (except the Mass of the Lord's Supper that night) nor on Good Friday nor on Holy Saturday (except the Easter Vigil Mass that night). We will pray Morning Prayer on those three mornings at



8:00 on Holy Thursday, at 8:00 on Good Friday, and at 8:00 on Holy Saturday. *In addition, Confessions* will be heard by Fr. Mark and Fr. John for *30 minutes on each of those three mornings after Morning Prayer* on Holy Thursday from 8:20 to 8:50, on Good Friday from 8:20 to 8:50, and on Holy Saturday from 8:20 to 8:50. Our praying of Morning Prayer will take approximately 15-20 minutes each morning. All are invited and welcome.

Morning Prayer is a part of the Liturgy of the Hours. The Liturgy of the Hours, also known as the Divine Office or the Work of God (*Opus Dei*), is the daily prayer of the Church, marking the hours of each day and sanctifying the day with prayer...making the day holy (from the start!) with prayer. The Hours are a meditative dialogue on the mystery of Christ, using scripture and prayer. The Divine Office "is truly the voice of the Bride herself addressed to her Bridegroom. It is the very prayer which Christ himself together

with his Body addresses to the Father." (SC 84) St. Basil the Great gives an excellent description of Morning Prayer in these words: "It is said in the morning in order that the first stirrings of our mind and will may be consecrated to God and that we may take nothing in hand until we have been gladdened by the thought of God, as it is written: 'I was mindful of God and was glad." (Ps 77:4) "Celebrated as it is as the light of a new day is dawning, *this hour also recalls the resurrection of the Lord Jesus*, the true light enlightening all people (see Jn 1:9) and "the sun of justice" (Mal 4:2), "rising from on high." (Lk 1:78) Hence, we can well understand the advice of St. Cyprian: "*There should be prayer in the morning so that the resurrection of the Lord may thus be celebrated.*" (GILH, no. 38) From the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops and available at http://www.usccb.org/prayer-and-worship/liturgy-of-the-hours/index.cfm



- Be available for one-to-one conversations or counseling sessions for those who may have a need or desire for conversation, advice, support, prayer. These conversations will take place outdoors (weather permitting) in the parish's gazebo rose garden adjacent to the rectory following each Mass; in the event of inclement weather, these conversations will be in the Lower Church.
- Meet with the college students of Monmouth University's Catholic Campus Ministry for their Sunday 7:00 p.m. on-campus Mass with Fr. Mark and for fellowship and conversation following that Mass.

The Sisters of Life is a contemplative/active religious community of women founded in 1991 by John Cardinal O'Connor *for the protection and enhancement of the sacredness of every human life*. Like all religious communities,



the Sisters take the three traditional vows of poverty, chastity, and obedience. They also are consecrated under *a special, fourth vow to protect and enhance the sacredness of human life*. 



I love those who love me, and those who seek me diligently, find me. (Proverbs 8:17)

I have often heard people say, "I was born Catholic." However, no one is born Catholic, we become Catholic at our Baptism. Thinking that our par-



Christ." Knowing that YOU ARE GOD'S CHOICE is reason to pause and reflect upon the great significance of life you've been given.

God never compels us to do His will, and at times we all ignore the promptings of the Spirit. Many persons reach adulthood who were never baptized because they were not of a Catholic background or had parents who did not cooperate. Others were never taught to put their Baptism into practice and so in ignorance, fell away from the Church and the sacraments. But the Holy Spirit never falls away – and those seeking the Truth hear His voice.

Perhaps you know someone who is not baptized, or was baptized but never received the sacraments of Reconciliation, Eucharist or Confirmation and is now interested in doing so. God has chosen them, too, and now they are responding to His invitation to draw closer to Him. You could and should play a pivotal role in their conversion by encouraging them and advising them to contact the local Catholic parish. And offer to pray with them and for them.

Over the centuries there have been various ways for adults to become full, participating members of the Catholic Church. Currently the process used is the **Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA)**. Those enrolled in RCIA are called catechumens, and after the Rite of Election, the Elect. They prepare themselves for receiving the sacraments of initiation, Baptism, Communion and Confirmation, by studying the Gospel, learning Catholic teachings and customs, and professing their faith in Jesus Christ and His Church

Baptism spiritually distinguishes the baptized from unbaptized due to the graces of the sacrament. While we all know that at Baptism we are cleansed of Original Sin and we receive the indwelling of the Holy Spirit, we also receive a minor exorcism, in which one asks God to protect a person from evil powers. For the unbaptized catechumen, we celebrate the **Three Scrutinies and Purification and Enlightenment** which include minor exorcisms. These begin starting the second Sunday of Lent and special readings are used at the Mass.

By identifying and healing what is weak or sinful in the hearts of the Elect, the Scrutinies are meant to fortify all that is good in them. By the grace of Christ they will help her or him in their decision to love God above all else and to do His will. Here at St. Michael's we join one Elect, Justin Glick, as he undergoes the Scrutinies on his journey into the Church. We also welcome the catechumens, Lisa Bowen and John Haladick, as they complete their sacraments of Reconciliation, Communion and Confirmation. All three will be made full members of the Catholic Church and the Parish of St. Michael's at the Easter Vigil this year.

The Church, including ourselves, has reason to rejoice that these new or fully initiated members join us in bringing Christ's love to the world and establishing the Kingdom of God. Like them, by recalling our own decision to turn away from sin and be faithful to the Gospel, we ask for the grace to do so and are reminded that God personally chose us, yes us, to know, love and serve him in this life and to be happy forever with Him in the next life.










### **Parish Goal = \$109,000**

## The Lenten Veiling of Statues and Crosses

It is informative and edifying to recall from time to time the theology and traditions behind our religious practices and customs. The Lenten veiling of the church's statues and crosses with purple fabric presents such an opportunity. This practice of veiling or covering dates back many centuries; its exact origin is unclear. The *Roman Missal* currently in use here in the United States provides an instruction (among the "rubrics" in red ink in that liturgical book) stating: "the practice of covering crosses and images in the Church from the Fifth Sunday of Lent is permitted....Crosses remain veiled until the end of the celebration of the Lord's Passion on Good Friday; images remain veiled until the beginning of the Easter Vigil." The veiling is optional. It is neither mandated nor prohibited.

The purposes and reasons for the veiling are several. The veiling of crosses and images is a sort of "fasting" from viewing with our eyes the sacred depictions; a sacrifice and a self-denial during the latter days of Lent.



The veiling creates a spiritual hunger and yearning for the return of the images and enhances our awareness and appreciation of them during their absence. The purple color is symbolic of the penitential nature of Lent, the kingship of the resurrected and glorified Jesus, and our mourning and sorrow over the suffering and death of Jesus and His time in the tomb. Just as the Lenten fast concludes with the Paschal feast, so too, our fasting from being able "to see the cross" culminates when the purple veils are removed from the Wood of Calvary on Good Friday. Likewise, our fasting from viewing the statues of the saints culminates on the night of the Easter Vigil with a renewed appreciation of the saints' love of Christ, their faith, their devotion, their closeness to God in heaven, their prayers and intercessions for us, and the example of holy living that they provide



Extra Sunday Mass for Covid-Vaccinated and Face Masked. We have added – temporarily – an extra Sunday Mass to our weekend schedule which began on Sunday, January 9 at 5:30 p.m. At this Mass all will be required to please follow ALL THREE of the following: (a) have been covid-vaccinated at least once, (b) wear a facemask throughout the Mass except to consume the Eucharist, and (c) receive Communion on the hand only and not on the tongue. Covid vaccination verification cards will NOT be required at this Mass....the honor system will be relied on. One covid vaccination is sufficient for attending this Mass, although the second and third vaccinations are strongly encouraged and preferred. If one is ill or experiencing covid symptoms or symptoms of other illness – as has been requested/recommended in the past – please remain at home. At our other Masses here at St. Michael's we have been following and we will continue to follow the guidelines of the State and Diocese: • vaccinations strongly encouraged (not required), • facemasks strongly encouraged (not required), • frequent handwashing strongly encouraged, . Communion on the hand (per the Diocese; the State is silent of course on this point) strongly encouraged (not required). With regard to Holy Communion, receiving on the hand and not on the tongue at ALL Masses is VERY, VERY, VERY strongly encouraged until we are all out of the covid woods (and required on the hand at the Sunday 5:30 Mass referred to above). Please pray that the date of emerging from the covid woods is soon!
