



Our Children's Attendance at Sunday Mass: A <u>Vital</u> Priority <u>PLEASE!!!</u>

Dear CCD Parents (cc: To All the Parishioners of St. Michael's Church):

The recent back-to-school days of September and the beginning of another new school year provide us with an opportunity for fresh starts, reminders, the breaking of old bad habits, and the initiating of positive/constructive new routines. In furtherance of those thoughts and those objectives, I wanted to remind all of our CCD families of "the new extra Sunday Mass" that I had announced at last weekend's Masses and that will be added to our parish's Sunday Mass schedule (on an experimental basis for at least one semester) beginning this Sunday, September 24, 2023 at 8:45 a.m. at the St. Jerome's Church.

The timing and the location of this <u>8:45</u> Sunday Mass <u>AT</u> the St. <u>Jerome</u> Church (which is adjacent to and physically connected to the St. Jerome's Schoolhouse where our 9:20-10:35 a.m. Sunday CCD classes are conducted) is intended to increase – to the greatest degree that our parish can muster – the opportunities for the parents of our Sunday CCD students to see to it that their children (of First Communion age and older) fulfill their obligation to attend Sunday

day's Masses, I am greatly conattendance at Sunday Mass by their parents. As I went into furduring those homilies last Satursome of the facts underlying that that I had taken an informal sur-CCD students at their religious

education classes on three separate occasions on the first Mondays of November, December, and January; those students, by the way, were in the middle of their final school year of preparations to receive the Sacrament of Confirmation in March. By going down the chronological list of *all nine Masses offered at St. Michael's every weekend*, I had asked for a show of hands as to "Who had attended this Mass or that Mass during the previous weekend?" here at St. Michael's. And, I also asked the 8th Graders Question #10 of the end of the survey which was whether they might have attended Sunday (or Saturday evening) Mass at some church other than at St. Michael's. The results of this Monday evening survey:

- <u>RE the First Weekend of November 2022</u> <u>six</u> out of 28 8th Grade students had attended Mass.
- <u>RE the First Weekend of December 2022</u> <u>four</u> out of 28 8th Grade students had attended Mass.
- RE the Second Weekend of January 2023 six out of 28 8th Grade students had attended Mass.

I was not shocked nor surprised by these survey results but I was greatly saddened by the "facts" that had been discovered and, as mentioned above, greatly concerned about the spiritual well-being of those 8th Grade students (candidates for Confirmation!) and the spiritual well-being of their younger siblings and of other younger "of-Communion-age" children who, I believe, are also most likely <u>not</u> attending Sunday Mass. We have approximately 175 children enrolled in this year's CCD program and of that number 130 or so are "of-Communion-age" or older (Grades 3-8) and therefore under the Church's obligation to attend Sunday Mass (and holy of obligation Masses, too). As I scan the congregation at all of our Saturday Vigil Masses and Sunday Masses, I see nothing even close to the vicinity of 130 children in the 8-14 years old age bracket in our pews.

During those homilies last weekend, I took a few additional minutes to remind the parents (and to remind all who were in attendance because this Sunday Mass NON-attendance situation is not a "parent-and-child ONLY problem" but affects *everyone* and needs to be a parish-wide concern for the welfare of the entire Church of today and the entire Church of the future) that, in summary, the reasons and purposes for the Sunday Mass obligation are:

• <u>Justice</u> – simply giving God His due. Giving back to the God who created us and who loves us beyond our wildest imagination a few of the minutes that He has given to us in the first place.




Thank you, Joe and Carmel Mirarchi!



WHAT IS IT?

WHAT IS THE NATIONAL **EUCHARISTIC REVIVAL?**

The National Eucharistic Revival is a three-year initiative sponsored by the Bishops of the United States to inspire and prepare the People of God to be formed, healed, concerted, united, and sent out to a hurting and hungry world through a renewed encounter with Jesus in the Eucharist - the source and summit of our Catholic faith. The revival has officially begun in June 2022, and its milestone event will be a National Eucharistic Congress in Indianapolis, Indiana, from July 17-21, 2024. The National Eucharistic Revival and National Eucharistic Congress are a direct response to the Holy Father's call for a "pastoral and missionary conversion which cannot leave things as they presently are" so that the Church the United States miaht "permanently in a state of mission." (Evangelii Gaudium, n. 25)

This Eucharistic movement seeks to bring together clergy, religious, laity, apostolates, movements, and parish and diocesan leaders to spur momentum, collaboration, and lasting impact for the re-



newal of the Catholic Church in the U.S. over the next three years. Each year will have a strategic focus for formation and missionary discipleship.

WHAT'S HAPPENED SO FAR?

THE FEAST OF CORPUS CHRISTI

June 19, 2022

We launch our national response to the Lord's call with widespread eucharistic processions and adoration on the Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ.

WHAT'S NEXT?

YEAR OF DIOCESAN REVIVAL

2022 - 2023

This first year of the Revival invites diocesan staff, bishops, and priests to respond to the Lord's personal invitation and equips them to share this love with the faithful through Eucharistic congresses and events.

YEAR OF PARISH REVIVAL

2023 - 2024

The second phase will foster Eucharistic devotion at the parish level, strengthening our liturgical life through faithful celebration of the Mass, Eucharistic Adoration, missions, resources, preaching, and organic movements of the Holy Spirit.

NATIONAL EUCHARISTIC CONGRESS

July 2024

At this historic event, more than 80,000 Catholics of all ages will gather in Indianapolis to reconsecrate their hearts to the source and summit of our faith.

YEAR OF GOING OUT ON MISSION 2024 - 2025

Having enkindled a missionary fire in the hearts of the American faithful, the Holy Spirit will send us out on mission to share the gift of our Eucharistic Lord.

Our Children's Attendance at Sunday Mass: A <u>Vital</u> Priority <u>PLEASE!!!</u>

- The purposes of all prayers including the prayer that is the Mass itself (using the simple acronym A-C-T-S) To give to God (along <u>with</u> fellow Mass-goers (as God intends and desires) as a <u>parish community assembled together</u>) our <u>A</u>doration (worship), <u>C</u>ontrition, <u>T</u>hanksgiving, <u>S</u>upplication.
 - The Third Commandment "Remember to keep holy the Lord's day."
- <u>The First Precept of the Church</u> "You shall attend Mass on Sundays and on holy days of obligation and rest from servile labor." (*Catechism of the Catholic Church* at 2042).
- <u>Canon #1247 of the Canon Law of the Church</u> "On Sundays and other holy days of obligation, the faithful are obliged to participate in the Mass." Canon #11 of the Canon Law of the Church in turn states that merely ecclesiastical laws "bind those who have been baptized in the Catholic Church or received into it, possess the efficient use of reason, and, unless the law expressly provides otherwise, *have completed seven years of age*."
- <u>Catechism #2180-2188</u> "On Sundays and other holy days of obligation the faithful are bound to participate in the Mass....<u>The Sunday Eucharist is the foundation and confirmation of all Christian practice</u>. For this reason <u>the faithful are obliged to participate in the Eucharist on days of obligation</u>, unless <u>excused for a serious reason (for example, illness, the care of infants)</u> or dispensed by their own pastor. Those who <u>deliberately fail in this obligation</u> <u>commit a grave sin</u>.
- Words of St. Paul "Bring your chil-[and worship] of the Lord." (Ephesians 6:4)
- <u>Gospel Words of Jesus</u> "Let the dren from coming to me." (Luke 18:16) See

 - (c) welcome and encourage the attendance of CCD parents and non-CCD siblings and other family members, and
 - (d) be on an experimental basis and re-evaluated in December as to Mass attendance and other criteria.

I appreciate everyone's time in reading this letter and reflecting on and praying over its concerns and objectives. As I said from the Ambo on Saturday and Sunday I am "<u>APPEALING!</u>" to our parents to <u>PLEASE</u> take to heart the obligation to attend Sunday Mass (*every* Sunday) themselves and to see to the fulfillment of their responsibility to cause their "of age" children to attend Sunday Mass (*every* Sunday). I am calling on parents to please set the good religious example that will help their children to form a good, strong foundation that will last for a lifetime. Another topic for another letter (and another homily) is the consequences and remedies when these obligations are not fulfilled and the level of culpability depending on age and circumstances etc. The Sacrament of Confession is always available of course so long as there is sincere repentance, avoidance of the sin of presumption, and mindfulness of the Act of Contrition's promise "to amend my life. Amen."

To conclude on a more upbeat note......Yes, Sunday Mass attendance <u>is</u> an <u>obligation</u>. May we all please cultivate in our own minds and in the minds of the children a sense of viewing that obligation as on <u>OPPORTUNITY</u> to praise and thank God and to reciprocate the love that He has given to us; seeing the obligation not as a burden nor as an intrusion on our freedom nor as "something else on the weekend's to-do list" but as a priority of our Sunday so that out of Justice and Love we willingly and joyfully give over that one hour (or fraction of one hour) to God our Father.

MESSAGE OF HIS HOLINESS POPE FRANCIS FOR THE 109th WORLD DAY OF MIGRANTS AND REFUGEES 2023 Free to choose whether to migrate or to stay

Dear brothers and sisters!

The migratory flows of our times are the expression of a complex and varied phenomenon that, to be properly understood, requires a careful analysis of every aspect of its different stages, from departure to arrival, including the possibility of return. 
